This year, around 1,720 Australian

women and girls will be diagnosed

with ovarian cancer - only 48% of

them will survive five years.



The OCRF funds research in four key areas: early detection, treatments, management of recurrence and prevention.

Over the next 10 years, Australia will lose 8,000 women to ovarian cancer, and more than 1.3 million will die globally.

SIGNS & SYMPTOMS

Ovarian cancer signs and symptoms can be vague, or can often be misdiagnosed as common female complaints. This is why over 70% of ovarian cancer diagnoses are made in the late stages. Here are signs and symptoms to look out for:

- Vague abdominal pain or pressure
- Feeling of abdominal fullness, gas, nausea, indigestion
- Sudden abdominal swelling, weight gain or bloating
- Persistent changes in bowel or bladder patterns
- Low backache or cramps
- Abnormal vaginal bleeding
- Pain during intercourseUnexplained weight loss
